ANNA VYAZEMTSEVA In 2008 and 2010 obtained a scholarship from Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Italy for studying at the Faculty of Architecture of the University of Rome "La Sapienza" for the research for the Ph. D. thesis "The Reconstruction of the Historical Center of Rome in 1920s -1930s and the Architecture of Rationalism", discussed in Moscow in 2011. In 2015, she obtained her 2nd Ph.D. in Architecture and Construction at the University of Rome "Tor Vergata" entitled "Art and Architecture, economics and politics between Italy and USSR (1910-1940)". In 2016 – 2017 she was a post-doc fellow in the University of Insubria. Since 2015 has been teaching the course "Rome: Art and History Open Air" at University of Rome "Tor Vergata", as well as the course "History of modern and contemporary art" at Istituto Europeo del Design in Rome (2015) and in Politecnico di Milano Polo Mantova.

She is a member of AISTARCH (Associazione Italiana degli Storici di Architettura), RAHN (Rome Art Historians Network), a member of scientific committee of Archivio Thayaht & RAM, and makes part of the editorial group of BFO-Journal (Switzerland) and Voprosy Vseobshej Istorii Arkhitektury (Russia).
