



The World Peace Council (WPC)

- Founded in Poland, 1950
- Different interpretations
- Strongly communist

Peace as a concept

- Peace and war
- Eastern vs Western Bloc
- Fight for peace and against “warmongers“
- Armed Forces as an option for maintaining

How to read China's peacefulness rhetoric?

- The peacefulness rhetoric as part of a huge public diplomacy strategies
- Parallel strategies in sports, cultural and educational sectors
- To seduce foreign public into these agendas
- To make China a global player

Conclusion


- China's claim to be a peaceful nation
