# Why a PhD in Economics?

- <u>Long</u>: 4-6 years, depending on places
- <u>Tough</u>: more exams, research even more stressfull, scholarships lower than the wage you could get with a MSc
- <u>But worth it</u>: learn to do <u>top research</u>, access to more skilled jobs (through a centralized <u>job market</u>), long-run satisfaction (higher wages, recognition, more chances to make a difference)



#### Where

- <u>US</u>: international, more competitive, tougher
- <u>Europe</u>: international, very good programs (in UK might require an entry MSc program)
- <u>Italy</u>: less international, shorter (max 4 years), but many good exceptions

#### How

- <u>GPA</u>: do your best!
- <u>GRE</u>: expensive, not easy, have to practice, do it in time (and possibly more than once)
- <u>Reference letters</u>: get to know your professors, especially those with more international exposure
- Motivation letter: be sincere, not standard (but also not naif)
- Some applications have a fee (especially in the US, 50/100\$)
- Some <u>scolarships</u> from outside: <u>Unicredit</u>, <u>Bank of Italy</u>

# Timing

- Have the GRE ready by <u>September</u> 2020 (i.e., prepare it in the Summer), then repeat it by <u>November</u> (if necessary)
- <u>September-November</u>: talk to (your most beloved) professors about your grades and motivation
- Whole package ready by <u>November-December</u>, then send everywhere
- <u>Deadlines</u>: for the US is December, for Europe January-February, for Italy February-May (but <u>check the webpage</u> of each institution)
- <u>Responses</u>: late Winter/early Spring



## Alternative 1: Research Assistantships

- <u>One year of work</u> as a RA with a renowed research group (e.g., Angrist at MIT, Voth at Zurich, Saggio at UBC, <u>others</u>)
- <u>Pros</u>: make an international experience, get to know good professors who might help you in the job search, or write a reference letter for a PhD/Internship/Job
- <u>Again</u>: requires good GPA + reference letters + motivation letter
- <u>Deadlines</u>: start in December-January, through the Spring



## Alternative 2: Internships

- <u>Preferential entry</u> for jobs in many institutions (governments, international organizations, private sector, etc.)
- <u>Again</u>: requires good GPA + reference letters + motivation letter
- <u>Deadlines</u>: all year round
