I believe that the strength of EEBL lies in the fact that it combines elements of both Economics and Law, with a particular focus on issues related to the European Union. Obtaining solid skills in both fields is a crucial condition if one desires to get a job in any European institution or even in firms dealing with European matters. As the number of students is not too large, both the teaching and administrative staffs are very supportive and care about each single student enrolled in the Master.

My experience in EEBL has helped me in both my academic and professional career. First, I got accepted at the Toulouse School of Economics, where I specialised in Industrial Organisation and Competition Law. After that, I had the opportunity to work as an intern with both the Irish Competition Authority and with the DG Competition of the European Commission. I then decided that it was time for me to get back to academia, and I am currently a Ph.D. candidate in Economics at the University of Tor Vergata.

To conclude, the EEBL Master can be a springboard to a successful career but, more importantly, it is a mind-opening process, thanks to students' exposure to a variety of different but related subjects.
