GETTING AROUND BORDEAUX

 The easiest way to get to Bordeaux from Paris is to take the train: 2hrs by TGV (high-speed train).

ENROLLMENT IN YOUR INSTITUTION

Before you can enroll in your institution, you must download proof of payment of the Contribution Vie Etudiante et de Campus (CVEC) – the student and campus life contribution fee.

Take note! Even if you have a pre-registration letter, you are not officially enrolled.

You must validate your enrollment with the institution's Service de la Scolarité (Admissions) as soon as you arrive.

RESIDENCE PERMIT (TITRE DE SÉJOUR)

• With the Cellule carte de séjour (Resident Card unit) at the Université de Bordeaux.

At the start of the academic year, from end September to end December, a one-stop desk for student residence permits (Cellule Carte de Séjour) is set up in coordination with the Préfecture. GOOD TO KNOW

• If you arrive in France with a VLS-TS long-term student visa: You must validate it online within three months of arrival: https://administration-etrangers-en-france. interieur.gouv.fr

• If you are an Algerian national or a student with a "concours" (tests) visa or a "mineur scolarisé" (enrolled minor) visa or a visa with the indication "carte à solliciter dans les deux mois" (residence permit to be requested within 2 months of entry): Depending on your campus, your residence permit application is made at the Préfecture or with the Service des Relations Internationales at your campus.

Take note: To renew your residence permit, you must apply within two months prior to its expiration date.

PRACTICAL INFORMATION /

OPENING A BANK ACCOUNT

If you stay in France for more than 3 months, it will be **much easier day-to-day if you open a bank account**, online or in one of the 170 bank agencies located in Bordeaux.

In France, opening a bank account is a right: www.service-public.fr > Argent > Comptes bancaires> Droit au compte

HEALTHCARE

In France, receiving medical treatment is **practically** free but you must be insured. Accordingly, signing up for medical insurance is mandatory.

As a student, you can also take advantage of the university medical services. In these health centers where consultations are free, you will be greeted by a team of doctors and nurses who can give personalized advice about health and prevention.

SIGN UP FOR ADDITIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE

You can also sign up **for top-up insurance** which will cover all health expenses not covered by the **free and compulsory health insurance**.

Take note: The plans and coverage levels differ from one company to another. To choose **a top-up insurance polic**y which meets your needs and your budget, you can **compare student health insurance plans** on the Internet.

HOUSING INSURANCE

In France, housing insurance is mandatory

The "garantie risques locatifs" - rental risk guarantee - is housing insurance which you can you subscribe with your bank or a private insurance company. Online subscription is also often possible.

EMERGENCY NUMBERS

SAMU: Call 15 Emergency Medical Services Police emergency: Call 17 in the event of violence, theft, robbery.

Fire Department: Call 18 in the event of fire, gas leak, water damage, natural catastrophe, or traffic accident.

Call 112: European emergency services number that's accessible from anywhere in the European Union in addition to the French numbers above.

GAINING CULTURE AND PARTYING

• Bordeaux offers many ways to cultivate yourself or party. Movie theaters, concerts, theaters, operas, museums, exhibitions, and festivals are on the program and most of the time, at reduced cost for students: http://www.bordeaux.fr/ > Découvrir et sortir > Culture

For entertainment or to pick up some culture in Bordeaux, you can choose from:

- a dozen movie theaters in the Bordeaux metropolitan area, including multiplexes (student rates, rewards cards) and two arthouse movie theaters: the Utopia in Bordeaux and Cinéma Jean-Eustache in Pessac.

- 11 major museums, including two scientific museums: the Musée de Bordeaux (Natural History Museum) and the Université Bordeaux Montaigne's Musée d'Ethnographie (Museum of Ethnography). In Bordeaux, the city's museums are free on the 1st Sunday of each month (excluding July and August). The **Pass'Musées** also allows you to visit museums at reduced rates:

TOP ATTRACTIONS /

Bordeaux's historic city center has been registered in the UNESCO World Heritage List since 2007.

 \bullet Old Bordeaux, an architectural ensemble of $18^{\rm th}$ century buildings.

• Quartier Saint-Pierre, in the historic city center, with its old picturesque streets.

• Place de la Bourse, a beautiful, horseshoe-shaped square, and the "Miroir d'Eau" or reflecting pool next to it.

• Quartier and Quai des Chartrons, the old district for Bordeaux's wine merchants along the River Garonne.

• Cité du Vin, housed in a futuristic building, for an interactive, sensorial journey through the world of wine (drink with moderation!).

• Musée d'Art Contemporain of Bordeaux (CAPC), or Contemporary Art Museum, housed in renovated warehouses.

• Saint-André Cathedral, with its separate bell tower, Tour Pey-Berland.

• Musée d'Aquitaine, or Aquitaine Museum, one of the largest regional history museums in France.

• Jardin Public, or Botanical Gardens, a green space in the heart of the city.

• Carnaval des Deux-rives, a fun, festive occasion.

APRIL

• Journées des Arts et de la Culture (JACES), Art and Culture Days to highlight cultural and artistic accomplishments in higher learning.
