Proud of my Italian blood and glad to be born and brought up in such a different land, because the mixture in my cultural background gave me a wider horizon.

Journalism was not an early vocation. When the time to decided what to study at the university was approaching, I had no idea what I should choose, I liked so many things and my personality always tends to indecision. I loved music above all, but lacked talent. Humanities was my obvious direction, but fear little possibilities of jobs. Also a Diplomatic career appealed to me for a while, until I realized that the way to reach the stage of Ambassador was too boring, bureaucracy and "recommendations" were not for me!

A solution, at least temporary, came when I saw the program of "Social Communication", the official name of Journalism in the U.C.A.B (Universidad Católica Andrés Bello), which had many different subjects --literature, arts, theatre, languages, philosophy, politics, history, PR and publicity, TV and radio production, sociology, communication, etc.-- Fantastic! I would have an approach to many subjects, even if in a superficial way, but that would help me understand what I really liked, after all I was young enough to eventually change faculty to a more "serious" one.

And that's it, since then I've been traveling in many countries and covering the international news. After Venpres, the United Press International (UPI). Later, daily newspapers "El Nacional", covering mainly Europe, "Economía Hoy", where I was chief editor for the International Section, and now as a correspondent for "El Universal" covering Italy and the Vatican.
