Course Description

The course covers the basic elements of macroeconomics in the context of advanced open mixed market economies. The course focuses on firms, labour, money and finance, consumption and investment, and macroeconomic policy.

Teaching Method

The course combines traditional teaching methods based on lectures, exercises and problems with experiments in active classroom learning, where students are given material before class which is then used as the basis for discussion and activities.

Topic 7	Inflation, unemployment and monetary policy (Unit 15, CORE textbook)
