What was your academic path after Global Governance?

After GG, I went on to study economics and econometrics, for a 2-years Master at Nova School of Business and Economics. Lisbon. Beautiful in experience, although it was not really planned. As a matter of fact, I embarked on a Master just because I needed more ECTS to enroll in what I ended up doing later: a 1-year postmaster program at the College of Europe, in Bruges. There, I studied European Public Policy Analysis, in the department of Economics. The first master allowed me to narrow down my focus to one single field, while with the second one, I applied what I had previously learned on European Union themes.

Could you tell about your current position?

As of now, I started a 1-year traineeship at the European Central Bank, in Frankfurt.

It is an amazing experience from which I am learning a lot. I work in the Prices and Costs Division of the Directorate General Economics, in a unit that deals with the forecasting of inflation and its main components, including wages. It is quite an econometrics-oriented job, which gives me a good opportunity to extend my academic knowledge into new, challenging horizons. The ECB is a wonderful employer, and the atmosphere here is very pleasant.



What are your future professional goals?

I do not have predefined specific career goals, just general ideas of how I want my life to look like. I admit that I would not refuse to keep working at the ECB after the traineeship, for one or two years maximum. After that, I would like to explore what is out there, changing between international institutions, think thanks, and maybe even considering a PhD or a research position in the private sector. In a true GG spirit, I would love to end up doing something that combines different thinkings, something morally rewarding, and something that allows me to keep my mind broad, challenged, and open. Briefly, I much rather become a generalist than a specialist.

Any career advice to the new GG Alumni/Students?

The best advice I could give is: you are still young, you have time, this is the moment for trial and error, so do not be afraid to experiment, change frequently, and try out things you never thought before. Sad but true, you will not get your dream job, nor will you settle down with a permanent position anytime soon. So, you might as well take the chance to figure out what you want from your life and your career, especially because academics and work are two very different worlds. This doesn't mean you should settle down - if there is something you really want to go for, then don't be afraid to try to get it until you succeed. But it also means to keep your mind receptive to new inputs opportunities, because you never know what may cross your way.

What did you do after graduating in Global Governance?

I've been on an interesting professional journey. The same week I graduated, I started as an Internal Communications Specialist at the World Bank, then moved to the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO). Here, I am the divisional One Health communications focal point, coordinating messaging across seven and teams an international treaty. I've had opportunities to expand my experience beyond my main role. For example, I worked with the International Fund for Agricultural Development and Rome's public universities on a flagship event focusing on jobs, innovation, and climate change. Continuous learning has been a priority for me. Since graduating, I've earned a professional marketing diploma, an advanced certification in Al policy, a professional certificate in Brand Management from Bocconi School of Management, and the Poynter ACES Certificate in Editing.

In 2023, I was selected for the Atlantic Council's Digital Sherlocks cohort.

These experiences, combined with managing large corporate social media accounts, led me to be a panelist at the 2022 World Forum for Democracy, discussing misinformation and social media. Most recently, I was nominated for and joined the Royal Society for Arts (RSA) Fellowship last year, which has been a valuable addition to my professional network.



Why did you choose to work in this particular field?

My time in GG really sparked my interest in understanding complex issues and finding ways to explain them clearly. This interest, combined with my exposure to the UN system, naturally led me towards communications.

What I appreciate about this field is its diversity. It covers a wide range of activities - from coordinating campaigns to creating content for various platforms. I've had the chance to work on different projects, like organizing multimedia exhibitions, writing feature stories, and redesigning websites. I've even picked up skills in video production and graphic design along the way.

The challenges vary from day to day, which keeps things interesting. Sometimes it's about distilling complex information into simpler messages, other times it's about finding creative ways to engage different audiences. It's not always easy, but it's certainly rewarding when you see people connect with and understand important issues.

How has GG contributed to your professional and personal development?

GG gave me a solid grounding in world affairs and current events, while also nurturing my curiosity. It was intense, teaching me crucial time management skills that have served me well in my professional life.

One of the program's biggest strengths was its diversity. Working with classmates from all over the world taught me how to collaborate effectively across cultures and viewpoints - a skill that's been invaluable in my work.

The program taught me to question assumptions, evaluate information carefully, and consider multiple perspectives. This approach has helped me both at work and in my personal life.

Overall, while the academic knowledge was important, it's these broader skills - curiosity, time management, cross-cultural collaboration, and critical thinking - that have really shaped my approach since graduating.
